Battlefields Trip

The 2017 Battlefields Trip began with another long journey down to Folkestone to catch the Eurotunnel across to Belgium and a very optimistic weather forecast!

For four days, the 35 students and four members of staff managed to visit a vast variety of sites important to the history of the First World War. We began with a focus on the First World War as a time of medical advancement and discussed this at the Ljissenthoek Military Cemetery built on the site of a number of casualty clearing stations in Flanders. Whilst there we visited the grave of William Gibson, a member of Ulverston Victoria Grammar School who lost his life, aged just 18 in July 1916.

We continued our trip with a full day exploring sites on the Ypres Salient including wandering the reconstructed trenches and learning from the exhibits at the Passchendaele Memorial Museum and finding out about the strategic importance



of this area of the front line from our tour guide, Tony. We visited a number of Commonwealth War Graves Commission Cemeteries where many of our students who had researched family members who fought in the Great War prior to the trip were able to find the final resting places of their relatives, which was very moving.

We had some free time in Ypres and most students enjoyed a bit of chocolate shopping! Later. attended the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate in Ypres, where Charli and Zoe took part in the service laying two wreaths

on behalf of our school to show that we still remember the sacrifice made by so many. On the third day, we journeyed to the battlefields of the Somme. We saw the vast Lochnagar crater, walked through the preserved trenches of Beaumont Hamel, and lunched at the Ulster memorial. At the Thiepval Memorial to the missing of the Somme, amongst the 72,000 names, we found the name of Alfred King, a member of Ulverston Victoria Grammar School and



we paid our respects by laying a poppy in his name. Following this, we visited the Devonshire Trench and learnt about the terrible story of the division who were mown down by a machine gun that

was not destroyed in the barrage prior to them going over the top. It was here that Miss Cockburn read the poem 'Before Action' by William Noel

Hodgson and we discovered how much these men were aware of the fate that awaited them. On our final evening, we undertook an analysis of the poems of the First World War.

On our last day, we journeyed to Vimy Ridge and learnt about the Canadian role in the First World War. We saw the preserved battlefield including trenches, shell craters





impressive underground tunnel system below the trenches. The sun burst through the foggy morning conditions just in time for us to see the Canadian memorial at Vimy Ridge in its full glory and learn the story about its design, which incorporates the names of the 11,000 Canadian servicemen who died

in France with no known grave. It was from Vimy we set off back towards Calais, Folkestone and on to Ulverston and home to rest after a busy, informative and moving trip.

their individual backgrounds gives a timeless quality to William Golding's masterpiece of dystopian fiction....

...but is it a fiction, or a representation of not only what happens when authority figures are removed, but what exists beneath the surface in all our psyches?

This adaptation (by Head of Drama, Mike Vogler) was a stripped back version of Golding's original masterpiece. It put the relationships of the boys under close scrutiny and presented what lies beneath the arguable fragility and frailty of the laws, morals and beliefs that hold society together.

Mike Vogler, Head of Drama, says - "The cast of Year 8 and Year 9 boys have been amazingly astute and enthusiastic in their work to stage this challenging piece of Drama. They have really enjoyed exploring the rivalries that arise



between their characters in the play, tackling the searching questions that it poses on many different levels. It was a sheer delight working with each and every one of the cast. Their zeal and boundless energy was an inspiration to us all on the staff directorial team." Richard Butler, Assistant Headteacher and Head of Performing Arts, said:

Here are a couple of problems our Y5 students picked for you to enjoy!

Problem 1

Problem 2

You have a 3-litre and a 5-litre jug that you can fill from a fountain of water. How do you fill one of the jugs with exactly 4 litres of water?

Cross Country

The top 6 from each year group went on to compete in the Barrow Schools Cross Country event on Wednesday 29th November. UVHS took a squad of over 50 students where we had some fantastic results from some amazing efforts. Minor Girls (Y7) Junior Girls (Y8 & Y9) Intermediate Girls (Y10) all came 1st overall. Minor Boys (Y7) came 1st overall and Junior Boys (Y7 & Y8) came 2nd overall. With 18 students finishing in the top 8 they will go on to represent Furness Schools at Cartmel Racecourse in January 2018.



Boys Football

Rugby League

UVHS Y9, 10 and 11 teams have performed excellently within Barrow Area group games this year. In their first game the UVHS Y9 team battled hard against a very good Furness Academy side finishing the stronger but going down 28-22. Playing Walney in our second game we played excellent Rugby League and although Walney battled back in the second half the result was UVHS 48-18. Finishing second in our group, the Y9 team played a very good Dowdales team in the Semi-Final. Although we put in an excellent effort, Dowdales too strong and skillful running out winners by 42-12.

Our Y10 team has improved considerably over recent times and took part in a double-header afternoon at Dowdales School to see who would take on the stand out St Bernard's Y10 team in the final. The first games put Dowdales against UVHS and Chetwynde against Millom. The last time we played Dowdales in Y8, Dowdales beat UVHS 82-0, but as I mentioned we have improved somewhat. To put it bluntly this UVHS team out-played Dowdales in every department winning 30-12. After a 10 minute break we took the field against Millom who had beaten Chetwynde easily. Millom were the much bigger team but on this occasion size on the Rugby league field did not matter and our excellent play continued to beat Millom 32-8. Our Y10 team will now play St Bernard's on December 1st in the Barrow Schools Area Final. Individually, two Y10 team members, Jamie and David have been invited to train with the Barrow Raiders U16 Academy Squad, which is a great achievement as both are still 14 years of age. Our Y11 team has been together since Y7, so it has been good to watch this team develop having had their good and at times not so good performances. We received a forfeit from St Bernard's in our first game, which is always a disappointment. Our second game was against Millom on a very wet pitch and we ran out resounding winners by 54-6. When writing this piece our Y11 team should have played Dowdales twice by now in the final, but due to a lack of pitches in our area with lighting and some horrendous weather, this game is still waiting to be played. Again, two Y11 team members, Jack and Rhys, have been selected for St Helen's and Barrow Raiders Academy squads respectively.

The Y8 rugby team made great progress this year despite a number of players from last year not continuing to play. In their first game against Dowdales they lost 10-42 but that after being 36 nil down at half time. An admirable second half performance with tries from Benji and Ollie. In the second game they dominated Millom, beating them 44-0 with outstanding performances from Gabriel, Ethan, Harvey and Ruben. Unfortunately they came up against last year's winners Furness Academy in the semi-final and were knocked out. To progress next year plenty of work on tackling and defence is needed. The Y7 rugby team have



impressed in all games so far this year and look like a team for the future. In their first outing they were joint winners of the Barrow Schools Festival, drawing the Final with Dowdales 4-4. In their cup competition they defeated Walney 20-0, St Bernard's 40-6 and Furness Academy 20-6 in the Semi-Final. Their defence has been excellent and once a confident kicker is found these scores will only increase. We need to convert our tries. Outstanding individual performances from Finn (7 tries), Rhys, Harry, Mckenzie and Nathan supported by a whole team committed to winning. More than 25 have regularly attended training, making selecting the team a difficult but pleasant problem to have. We now wait to see who our opponents are in the final.



News from Science

Medical Mavericks



UVHS hosted a 2 day mini-medics event. Day 1 consisted of 68 Y9 and Y10 students from UVHS, Millom, St. Bernard's and Furness Academy, carrying out a range of medical techniques, for example, looking at respiratory and cardiac tests. Students took blood from an arm, looked at their heart, liver, bladder and kidneys with an ultrasound machine. They applied some of these techniques to sport's science physiology and they found out about a range of healthcare careers to inspire our future medics.

A-Level Masterclass

Y10 students from Dowdales attended an A-level masterclass here at UVHS. In biology, students investigated the properties of arteries and veins by applying load. Students applied their maths skills in order to make conclusions and propose the proportions of collagen and elastic fibres in both blood vessels. In chemistry, students took part in hands on practical session where they used the practical technique of reflux on a microscale in order to make and purify vinegar. In physics, students investigated circuits. Students had a tour of the science department and had many questions about our exciting extracurricular provision at sixth form and the number of successful applicants to Oxbridge and Russell group universities.

Newcastle University Medical School Come to UVHS

Two Medical graduate ambassadors for Newcastle University Medical School came to UVHS to run a Medical workshop with all of our Y8 students. Students had a refresher of heart problems and CPR from their training in Y7,

investigated the structure and problems with the heart and investigated their pulse and oxygen levels. Students had lots of questions about different healthcare careers and they gave a vast array of advice, as well as inspiring our students and what to do in the event of an emergency.







On 28th September, seven Y9 students attended the Infinity Festival at West Lakes Academy, Egremont. The groundbreaking Science programme, headlined by Professor Brian Cox, was the first of its kind to be held in Cumbria. It involved over 200 students from schools all over the county and aimed to inspire students to pursue careers in the STEM subjects. Our students took part in hands-on experiments and workshops and attended influential talks by world leaders in Science and Technology. Parents joined us all for an evening reception, which included a showcase of the day, some exciting demonstrations and an interview session with Professor Brian Cox.

History



History Lecture Trip

39 Y12 and Y13 Historians attended a day of lectures in Manchester on Wednesday 29th November 2017. Dr Jenni Hyde from the University of Lancaster gave two lectures on why the personal rule of Charles I broke down by 1640 and what caused the Republican Government to collapse. Followed by Dr Michael Braddick from the University of Sheffield who delivered a fascinating degree level lecture on how important religion was to the outbreak of the English Civil war. Finally, we had a lecture from Dr Ian Atherton from Keele University on the key question of why Charles II was a more successful ruler than James II was. It was a very useful and informative day which both enlightened our students about the realities of university lectures and provided them with a lot of relevant contextual knowledge for their Stuart Britain course.

- Mock interview practise: (delivered by various post 16 providers) The workshops are delivered and planned by the employers and the workshop content is identified by the employers resulting from their



observation that these are the skills young people in the Furness area lack when applying for work.

John Rogers from Siemens Subsea said "The day gives the Y10 students the opportunity to fully understand what will be required of them during their path to employment." Consequently, the benefit of

the Work Ready Day is two-fold in that it helps to fill skills lacking in the local labour market as well as providing our students with the opportunity to gain those skills directly from employers and other post 16 providers who will be looking for them and assessing them in the real world. Tom Gower from Booths said of our students, "We saw some great potential employees of the future. Students were engaging and positive with good communication skills. They interviewed better than many people we have interviewed for the real thing" Y10 students concluded, "The day was a complete success. It taught us a lot of skills that we will need for employment in later life. It helped everyone understand more about employability, teamwork and the interview process."

UVHS Careers Fair

Our annual careers fair took place on the 1st November with over 30 post 16 providers and 93% of students and their parents in attendance.
