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MR HARDWICK WRITES...

here are moments in a teaching career when you are awestruck by something the children under your care achieve, whether individually or as a group. One such occurrence was the concert performed by the UVHS band and the Band of the Royal Marines recently at the Coronation Hall, it was guite simply magical. One hundred of our children holding their own with professional musicians to create an evening of warmth and achievement.

Ithough I was only appointed the substantive Headteacher at UVHS from January; this Easter holiday marks my one year anniversary running the school. I have relished this fascinating and challenging role. Every day is different and we do our best to ensure that the high level of achievement, abundant opportunities and exemplary care for our students continues to be the best available. This is against a background of mounting pressure on our schools, with increasing ever accountability, but

> the constant eroding of school finances as costs rise and income remains the same. In this climate we are seeing a rise in the amount of anxiety and mental health issues in our schools, which is mirrored by a decline in support services from outside school.

> > •onsequently we concern ourselves very intently with the wellbeing of our students, doing our best to minimise the pressure our

students are under and supporting them whenever necessary. Not only are the new courses at GCSE and A Level more challenging and more focussed on the final exams than ever before, but students are also under growing pressure to conform to what society has defined as the norm, both through the cult of celebrity and the ever pervasive influence of social media. It is our role as a school to minimise the impact of these pressures and allow students to concentrate on their learning and on just being children.

> t is for these reasons, as well as for safeguarding, that the use of mobile phones has never been allowed in school. Our high standards of uniform are also important in the removal of pressures on students created by peers and society to look a certain way and thus be judged by these criteria. True there are other benefits to be gained from uniform, such as a shared ethos and outside perception of the school as a whole by the local community and local employers; but it is the social and economic levelling that it engenders which is so important.

s I look back on the last term I see happy students contributing

to the life of the school and achieving well in and outside of lessons. We have high expectations for the outcomes this summer in both GCSE and A Level exams. However the greatest understanding of education is really about what comes outside the classroom. Not only have the school band played with the Royal Marines this term and the sheer quality and professionalism of this is a real credit to the students and the music department; when combined with the resurgence of dance and drama for "Hairspray" the warmth of the contribution made by hundreds of our children is breath taking. This is the best job in the world, particularly when it involves working with such talented students and staff.



welve Year 9 students attended the STEM challenge day at Lancaster University. They split up into teams to represent Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths and competed against other schools from around Cumbria and Lancashire. The challenges included; designing a chemical reaction with a specific completion time, completing a Maths treasure hunt, building a wind turbine and prototyping a smart musical instrument using computing technology. The students worked exceptionally hard, applying the skills and knowledge they had learnt in their subjects at school. It was a great experience to use the facilities and resources at the university and to get a taster of the campus environment. 

The students had ownership of what was now very much their production. It was a proud and poignant moment and reminded me of why I enjoy the role of Head of Drama at UVHS so much.

t would be impossible, or at the very least excruciatingly difficult to produce a school production that demands so many different facets single handedly. I feel ever indebted to the boss Mr Butler, for his support, musical direction and boundless energy. Also to Mrs Heginbotham for her skillful musical input. Beyond the Performing Arts department we have built a team of teachers from across a range of subject areas who give up their free time to help make things happen. Mrs Cooper and Mr Rice have been fantastic assistant directors, and Miss Bird was her usual brilliant self as choreographer. Miss Walmsley and Miss Thompson also helped with scenery, props and the running of an efficient backstage area and dressing rooms. It couldn't have happened without them.

think the cast's experience can be summed up in the words of this year's lead Jess Charlesworth who said "I feel that the school productions are always of an amazingly high standard. It's felt so inclusive, too – working with the younger students and seeing them experience being involved in the commitment of the show. he challenge took place on 7th February 2019 in school and was open to any student in year 11 or below.


