en years ago, when I joined our school as an Assistant Headteacher, I was asked for a photograph and a small piece of writing about myself to go in the newsletter. I am now writing to you all, for the first time as Headteacher of Ulverston Victoria High School. During the last ten years both the school and myself have changed beyond



🚤 all recognition.

I joined UVHS at a dark hour in its history. It was in Special Measures following an OFSTED inspection. I was employed to support the acting Headteacher at that time to develop teaching and learning and behaviour for learning. When I look at the school now, with a positive OFSTED report, first rate teaching, exceptional examination results and the wealth of enrichment activities available for our children, it seems almost miraculous to see how far we have come. As I look back at the rapid progress we made to move from Special Measures to Outstanding, it might have appeared, to someone looking from the outside, as miraculous. However, we know that this was achieved by collaboration and hard work by our students, parents and teachers; led by a determined, passionate leadership team. It was in this environment that I learnt my trade as a senior leader. As the school moved forwards I held different roles, with different priorities, requiring different personas, first as Deputy Head, driving the curriculum and school improvement, but with an overview of behaviour management in the school. Then as Head of School when I fulfilled the role of Headteacher for two days a week. It has been

a fantastic journey, and as the school has developed, so have I. I now have a new challenge, requiring additional skills, that of leading this school into

the next chapter of its history.

I am extremely proud of UVHS present, it is a place of industry, achievement and high aspiration. I am constantly awed by what our children achieve inside and outside of school and the skill and dedication of our teachers and support staff. Ulverston Victoria High School is a beacon for modern education, at the centre of a warm supportive community, where parents are proud to support and send their children. Now is the time for this school to develop further, to grow in ambition and deliver the best education possible for our amazing students.

n October, five Y9 Computer Science girls visited Queen Elizabeth School for a robotics workshop using VEX IQ speed build kits. After a keynote speech on robotics, associated careers and routes into them through school

courses, the students moved on to the hands-on activities.

First was a speed build activity. Each of the 6 teams was given a VEX IQ kit, and had to

quickly assembly the robots. Fiddly connectors from the brains to the motors and sensors ensured attention to detail was required throughout! Once built there was a short explanation on how to program the robot brains, which the students quickly took to. Soon enough 6 VEX IQ robots were allowing their controllers to master driving them around the class.

Once proficient, the teams competed over a challenging course devised by Mr Evason and Miss Chambers. The friendly competition began with



USA College Visit

im Bock, vice-president and dean of admissions at Swarthmore College, Philadelphia, USA gave a presentation to around 50 UVHS Sixth Form students.

Swarthmore College is one of a growing number of liberal arts colleges in the USA where students get to study a mixture of humanities, social sciences and the natural sciences. At Swarthmore, 13% of their student body is made up of international students.

For British students, the upfront cost of US colleges can be eye-watering – one year of tuition at Swarthmore costs \$44,368 (£29,000). Jim was keen to stress that the selective college can offer grants and scholarships to those who get in. He explained that about 50% of the college's students receive grants, and the average is for about \$38,700 dollars a year. This means that the actual cost to students is actually around \$6000 a year.



Jim then went on to explain how the application and admissions process works for applying to University in the USA. The talk was very informative and very well received by our students.

ENGLISH Extra Curricular Activities for Sixth Formers

Our various extra-curricular activities for sixth-formers recently resulted in the creation of IngSoc: the UVHS Sixth Form English Society. As well as our department magazine, The Tenth Circle, we're now running a programme of weekly events that includes 'Write Club', for the creatives; Cinema Night, for the film buffs; Debating Club, for the speakers; and a Book Club, for the obsessive readers. well as early Christmas gift purchases. Look out for details of our next after-school event, coming soon. * pun fully intended.






n Friday 16th November the UVHS dancers took to the stage in the Dance Extravaganza!

Well done to all the pupils for your outstanding commitment and effort! A lot of money raised for the new dance department with exciting things to come! Watch this space.








The service was more poignant this year, as Scafell Pike was gifted to the National Trust soon after 1918 along with 13 other summits. The students showed amazing grit and determination to reach the top of the 'world's greatest war memorial'. They conducted themselves admirably and it was a fitting close to UVHS's Remembrance activities.

BATTLEFIELDS & REMEMBRANCE

October saw some of the Y9 students travel to France and Belgium for the English and History



Battlefields Trip, the significance of which was more poignant with being it the 100 vear anniversary of The Great War.

Students visited battlefields and saw the extent of the war with the vast number of gravestones and names on memorials. Some



students were even able to find lost family relatives and pay their respects. The students also experienced what life would have been like in the trenches. Adam and Jessica were given the honour of representing

UVHS by laying a wreath at a ceremony at the Menin Gate.




Visit to Paris

Ithough it now seems a long time ago, the Y10 French visit to Paris at the end of the Summer term was a very memorable experience. We arrived at the airport just as France had won the 2018 World Cup. The atmosphere on the Metro was amazing and it felt like the whole of France had come to Paris

to celebrate. Our first meal was spent looking out onto the Place de la République where we could view the celebrations from a comfortable distance.

We managed to fit lots of activities into the 3 days. These included a boat trip down the Seine, a visit to the The Louvre Museum, fantastic views from the top of the Eiffel Tower while others enjoyed the visit to the Pantheon to see the final resting place of famous people such as Marie Curie and Louis Braille. It was encouraging to hear the students practising their French in the shops, market, restaurants and hotel.



As always, the students were excellent ambassadors for their school and country. They coped well on the Metro system and didn't complain about the long distances we made them walk. It was such a unique experience being in Paris at the time of national celebrations and we are sure it is one that our students will never forget.

Sixth Form Trip to Kenya

In July a group of 13 sixth form students, accompanied by Mr Ford and Miss Shaw, embarked on a volunteer trip to Kenya. We arrived at Mama Kerry's Hope Academy in Nakuru (just outside Nairobi) armed with donations of clothes, toys and school equipment brought over from the UK. The children and staff were very happy to see us, and gave us the warmest welcome, singing and dancing for over half an hour. These children came from the most challenging of backgrounds, and would not get any education without this provision.

Before we knew it construction work on the school building began. The local builder, Benji, had us mixing concrete, fetching water and taught us a new method of plastering which was simple enough...throwing spades of wet concrete at the wall. It was hot, dirty but fulfilling work.

The school was set up by the charity African Adventures, and although it receives no government funding, our second day on site brought a government inspector who said the existing classrooms were too small and lacked light. This was enough to close the school. We all set to work with the rudimentary tools available, and within two days, two classrooms had been doubled in size, and now had windows. This satisfied the inspectors who



returned just as we finished. Playtime offered us a welcome break from the tough building work. The children taught us new games and songs, which we were all singing by the end of the week. The last day of volunteering arrived all too soon and after a chapatti party with the staff, a tearful goodbye marked the end of a fantastic few weeks.

Our Kenya adventure ended with a tough five day trek up Mount Kenya. The altitude and physical endurance required everyone to push themselves further than they had ever done before but the sight of the sun rising above the mountains was definitely worth it.

After being part of this amazing adventure, we believe everyone learned something new. Experiencing life in such a poverty-stricken area made us appreciate the things we take for granted and gave us a completely new perspective on life; the children we worked with were so happy and accepting of the world they are living in. We experienced a very different culture the most authentic way and the memories and lessons we have learned will stay with us for a very long time. - Alex 13.5

by winning the school heat, the local final and then coming second in the nationals. This year, 14 students entered the school heat where they were given a brief of producing a hot main course for two people, spending no more than £10.

Dishes included; pizza and dough balls, prosciutto wrapped chicken with tomatoes, chicken and mushroom risotto, steak with triple cooked chips, and incredibly, two similar dishes of hake with beau blanc sauce, one finished with leeks and samphire, the other with cockles and mangetout. Dishes were judged by Food Preparation and Nutrition teacher, and founder of Charity Aroma Catering, Mr Hall along with the Head Chef of Virginia House, Craig Sherrington who recently appeared on BBC's Great British Menu, and who is also an ambassador for Aroma.

The two judges said that the scores were very close, and the quality of the food cooked, along with the presentation, was superb, especially given the students

cooking were between the ages of 12 and 15! They also commented saying that with such a shortage of chefs, not just locally, but nationally, it was great to see so many young cooks engaging and being passionate about cooking.

The UVHS heat of the Future Chef competition was shared by Braedon - 9.3 and once again Sophie - 11.2 in a very competitive round. They will now progress to the next round where they will compete at Kendal College in December against the winners from other local schools.
