

Our students were awarded the Simon Martindale Trophy and a £250 book voucher for school. Well done to all involved!

UK Maths Individual Challenges 2018

Over 50 of our Years 7 & 8 took part in this year's national Junior UK Individual Maths Challenge.

Great results – Lily and Dan went straight through to the prestigious Olympiad round and Rebecca was invited to do the Kangaroo round. The students were also awarded 4 gold, 15 silver and 11 bronze certificates with the rest all highly commended- well done all!

Y9 Trip to Salzburg


ate June saw a group of Y9 students visit our partner school in Seekirchen near Salzburg, Austria. Students flew to Munich before crossing the border by train into Austria. On the first day, we visited the school where we took part in lessons in German, and then spent the afternoon visiting the lake and getting to know our Austrian partners. In the evening, we had a beautiful sunset walking tour of the city where we visited Mozart's

birthplace and former residence, as well as several locations

from The Sound of Music.

The second day was spent visiting Hellbrun Palace and some more filming locations including the gazebo from The Sound of Music. We then headed into The Alps where we walked up to the impressive Hohenwerfen Castle, practised walking on stilts and watched a bird of prey display. In the afternoon, we headed into the salt mines in Hallein crossing the border into Germany and back again but this time deep underground, going down slides and wearing some rather lovely outfits!

On the third day, we spent the day in Salzburg, visiting Haus der Natur, learning about the Geography and Natural History



In the evening, our lovely Austrian hosts had organised a meal in a traditional restaurant and we were able to sample some local food and spend some more time with our buddies. The students on the trip embraced all challenges and opportunities and Miss Groves, Mrs Cooper and Mr Reader were very proud of how they conducted themselves. We were made to feel very welcome in Austria and all had a fantastic week discovering the similarities and differences between our regions and cultures, realising shared passions and interests and forming some lasting friendships. We look forward to seeing our Austrian friends again when they visit us in September.



VIVELA FRANCE!

t the end of this term, we went to Normandy for our annual French language visit. 45 students spent the week practising their French speaking skills with the help of 'animateurs' from Le Chateau de la Baudonnière in the heart of the Normandy countryside.

At the Chateau, students took part in a variety of activities including climbing, fencing, archery, aeroball and bread-making. Pupils made some imaginative bread shapes and then were able to eat their creations at the evening meal. All

the activities were conducted in French, which helped to extend students' vocabulary and confidence. We had an evening visit to Mont St Michel where students could practise their buying skills and appreciate the UNESCO protected site. Students had the opportunity to find out more about the Second World War at the 360 degree cinema, which gave a moving account of the sacrifices made by our ancestors during the liberation of France

in 1944. We also visited the D-Day Landing beaches at Arromanches and the American War Cemetery at Colleville-sur-mer.

Other highlights of the visit included a visit to an organic goat farm where some were lucky enough to hold and milk the goats. Everyone enjoyed practising their speaking skills with the traders at the market in Villedieu-les-Poêles and they were able to buy some interesting combinations for their picnic lunch. Pupils also participated in the final talent show and a special mention must go to Hazel, Harvey and Callum for their outstanding individual performances.

This was another fantastic educational experience for our Y8 students. It was great to see the way they responded to new challenges and their thought and consideration for each other. We hope to offer a similar visit in 2019 to Y8.

YEAR 10 GEOGRAPHY **FIELD TRIPS**



s part of the new GCSE geography specification, pupils are Arequired to attend two days of fieldwork in both a physical and human geography setting. Just over 100 Year 10 pupils visited two locations earlier this year to collect a range of data which will then be used to support their final exam in Year 11.

On one of the days, the students from Year 10 visited Settlebeck Gill in Sedbergh to collect data on the river and to investigate how it changes from source to mouth. Some pupils dared to get their feet wet to gather information for a river cross section, whilst others got their hands wet in order to analyse sediment change.

The second day involved a trip to Lancaster to investigate land use change and variations in environmental quality. Pupils walked from Lancaster's rural-urban fringe into the city centre and

collected data on land use, building quality and traffic/pedestrian counts.


Since their trip, Year 10 have presented and analysed the data in order to draw conclusions and evaluate their experience.

nce again UVHS students entered



Congratulations to Islay, Vinnie and all the students who participated this year.


UVHS BANDS

The Swing Band signed off this academic year (in terms of UK engagements) with a great afternoon concert at Grange Bandstand. The crowds (a very big audience, especially considering England were playing Panama at the same time) were entertained by a wide variety of music from the 1940s to the present day and all the players did themselves and the school proud. Next stop Paris, where they will perform 2 concerts – one televised

from Disneyland to celebrate Bastille Day and the other in central Paris at the Jardin de Luxembourg. Over this year the Swing Band has helped to raise over £12,000 for local charities through their musicmaking which is a huge testament to the students involved.

The Wind Band finish the year with the Summer Concert, alongside the Junior Band, String Orchestra, Choir and all the smaller ensembles before starting to prepare for next year's 8-day concert tour to Italy and a concert weekend with the Royal Marines Band at The Coronation Hall on the 1st and 2nd March. In June, the UVHS Music Department was excited to welcome internationally renowned trumpeter, Paul Archibald, to the school to lead a masterclass with various brass players and then the Senior Brass Ensemble.

For the first hour, Paul gave public lessons to Emma (trombone), Francis (tuba) and David (trumpet). The second half of the masterclass was with the UVHS Senior Brass Ensemble. Paul rehearsed three pieces from their repertoire and discussed the fine points of small-ensemble playing with the students before implementing what they had learnt in performances of excerpts from those pieces.



As winners of the national composition competition run by the Royal Opera House, Tabi and Alex have completed the final session in the recording studio with the orchestra under the baton of one of the finest conductors in the world, Sir Antonio Pappano: he rehearsed the orchestra and discussed the preparation for the final recording with each student, giving them complete artistic freedom. The recordings will be available in August, and will be played at the Royal Opera House throughout the 2018/2019 opera season.

BUMPER YEAR FOR BRONZE AWARD

This year with support from DofE North, UVHS has trialled a new way of running our Bronze DofE award by opening it up to the whole year group in both Y9 and 10. All students in these year groups had the opportunity to sign up for the award, leading to record numbers with 63 signing up for the Y10 award and 44 in Y9.

The difference in this application process meant students were required to complete two of their sections (physical, volunteering and skill) by a deadline in order to be eligible for an expedition with school this year. Our students took on this challenge and, even with tight deadlines for Y10, 47 students were successful and have gone on to complete expedition training and a practice expedition this year. As usual, the choice of activities for sections has been extensive, from volunteering in the local library and with local charities, performing arts, model mak-

ing and improving fitness at the gym. Students are demonstrating they are well-rounded young people with the commitment and skills that will look impressive on any CV and application form! Not only have we seen an increase

in overall numbers but the number of boys talking part has risen dramatically and the commitment to the award shown by all these students has been outstanding. Many school staff are supporting the pupils in different extra-curricu-

lar activities that they are using towards the award, even Mr Hardwick has been an assessor for a student's skill section this year.

During their practice expedition on the Cumbria Way participants experienced a mix of weather but the rain held off until all groups arrived at the campsite on Sunday 17th March. Despite this, all groups remained in good spirits and were excellent representatives for our school, following the countryside code at all times and demonstrating the skills needed to navigate their qualifying route unassisted.

Gold Duke of Edinburgh This year has seen 17 students enrol on the Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award. They will be improving their skill sets by taking on a physical activity, learning a new skill and helping the local community by volunteering. They have

already undergone their expedition training. The students will take part in 4 expeditions, 2 and 4 day Lakes expeditions and a 4 day Yorkshire expedition, and then their 4 day assessment in the Cairngorm Mountains of Scotland.

The latest expedition in Yorkshire has seen the students brave the weather (for a change - sunshine and heat!) and the evil midge, even though conditions were arduous, and at times, the camping was more like a practice for going to Glastonbury, they were successful. They have all learnt lots about themselves in terms of tenacity and endurance, but have also developed vital employability skills like team work, leadership and problem solving. Well done to all. Bring on Scotland!

(hiking, ultra-running, snowboarding), sci-fi books & shows, music and animals – especially my two cats!


ello, my name is Miss Hine and I am delighted to be joining the Design, Technology and Art department in September. Since graduating with a degree in Fine Art, I have pursued



Aroma Ambassadors, which include restaurants and groups such as Virginia House, and the English Lakes Hotel group, sifted through applications deciding which individuals would receive funding, and the amount they would get. Jamie, Niamh and Alfie have all received funds to help them cover the costs of transport as they move onto the English Lakes Culinary Academy, and Bradley has received support to help him pay for transport, chef whites and a set of knives as he moves on to Kendal College.

These 4 students also join Ethan and Tom in obtaining places to continue their food studies next year. On behalf of everyone at UVHS, and Aroma Catering and it's Ambassadors, congratulations and good luck with the start of your training and careers.

ENGINEERING CLUB

This year the Engineering Club has been taking part in 2 different challenges. The first being the Furness Lego League Competition. The project was based on cleaning up oil spills. The students presented to a range of judges including representatives from United Utilities and BAE, and the response was overwhelmingly positive. The tasks included a project board testing their programing skills to gain points towards the competition and the design of a robot capable of completing each task. The students also designed an excellent device to help locate the robot in the correct starting position each time. The design of this locating device really impressed our STEM ambassador from Siemens Subsea who joins us every week.

The second challenge was the Secondary Engineer's Competition. The students had to identify a problem in any walk of life, then design and develop a solution for



it. Some of the ideas were very creative and included ideas like a drone stretcher for military use, a micro car for cities and a machine to recycle everyday waste into useable materials. Students had to submit their ideas through sketches and a written paragraph to a panel of judges, as they would not be present in the judging process. We are waiting on the results of this competition but all students will receive feedback before the end of the year.

The students have begun mentoring the younger members of the club to develop their programming skills as the Furness Lego league is a KS3 competition and our current Y9 students will be unable to enter. This is good news for any new students, as we will be looking for new members. If you are interested in continuing this competition from your primary school or are interested in learning programming skills, teamwork and problem solving in design come and join us!



BUTTERFLY RELEASE

Y8 have looked at the life cycle of a butterfly and the interdependence of species in the environment. The Science department are looking to establish a conservation area in the school grounds. By introducing



butterflies (these were Painted Ladies!) into the area. It is hoped they will lay eggs and become an established species there.

Restaurant UVHS (a collaboration between UVHS and the Aroma Catering Foundation) was opened once again in April serving guests a four course, fine dining meal. The kitchen and front of house team were

made up of students in Y7-11 in a cross curricular event with Employability, and was led by Food and Nutrition Teacher, and charity founder Mr Hall. Diners were served dishes such as crab and avocado, quail and edible snow.

Parent Pay As you know, in January 2016 UVHS introduced

ParentPay which is our on-line payment platform for school meals, trips, visits and other activities. Over 85% of you are now using ParentPay regularly. Thank you all for making this a success!

Do you know for instance how to set up free low balance alerts for the school lunch account?

Set Alerts Within ParentPay

You can set free e-mail alerts within ParentPay to notify you of a low lunch account balance or new payment items for your children.

You will need to register your e-mail (which you will normally have done as part of the account set up) in the Profile Settings tab at the top of the page. Also register your mobile phone if you wish to receive text alerts.

Please note that e-mail alerts are free to receive text alerts you will need to add credit to your text message balance. You will not be charged for any text alerts sent by school.

Go to the Communications tab and select Change Alert Settings.

You can set your low balance threshold balance. School recommends £5. You have the option to receive e-mail or text alerts by ticking either or both options. If you do not wish to receive alerts untick these options.

Don't forget to save your changes at the bottom of the page.

New Cash Policy

Applicable from 1st September 2018

Following a review of our procedures, we regret that from 1st September 2018 we will no longer be able to accept cash payment for trips, visits and other activities. This is for safeguarding and security reasons as well as administrative efficiency.

Students will still be able to bring cash to top up their lunch accounts at the cash machines in school and we can still accept cheque payment for all trips, visits and activities.

For all items other than school lunch account top up, parents are requested to make payment on-line via ParentPay or by cheque.
