MR HARDWICK WRITES...



here is always a slightly apprehensive amongst teachers as the day Years 11 and 13 receive their exam results approaches. The amount of work put in by students, but also by teachers and of course parents, to give our children the best possible chance, is immense and it is not surprising that everyone involved is nervous with anticipation as they open envelopes or look

down lists, searching for individuals from their form or teaching groups. So the joy is shared by all involved when a set of results as good as those attained by our students is revealed. It is therefore with great pleasure, that I open this Newsletter by congratulating our children on their exceptional results. By the government's favoured measure, these are the best GCSE results that UVHS students have achieved. There have also been astonishing individual successes at GCSE and at A Level, with many students achieving exceptionally high grades and making brilliant progress from their starting points. These outcomes are one of the aspects of working in a school that make being Headteacher of UVHS a privilege and a delight and give me a sense of pride in the achievements and dedication of our staff and students.

owever, we must remember that this school is not just about exam results; we should remember that every Year 11 student this year not only left with qualifications to take them to the next stage of their life, but also left as a well-rounded individual with experiences, skills and values to make them successful in the future.

ou will see from this newsletter opportunities what students have had in the last term; from being on the sports field competing for their house on Sports Day to representing

the school in area and County events. Some have taken part in the concerts or shows, then toured with the Music Department around Lake Garda in Italy as ambassadors for the excellence of the music provision at UVHS and the ethos and values of the school. Students have shown incredible determination to complete Duke of Edinburgh Bronze and Gold awards where they have been put outside their comfort zone. Year 10 have been challenged with interviews by real employers and Year 7 have worked on the John Muir Award as part of Enrichment Week. All of this against a background of dozens of other extracurricular activities taking place every day at lunchtime and after school, to say nothing of the day to day business

of academic achievement.

o to the future, as we start the new term, UVHS is the biggest it has been since I joined the school in 2008, with the Sixth Form topping 300 for the first time. This is an exciting time to be at UVHS and I am optimistic about the future. We have had to manage the school finances very carefully over the last few years as school budgets have been slashed in real terms. However, there is just a glimmer of light at the end of the financial tunnel, though I say that with fingers crossed. We say goodbye this year, with sincere sadness, to a number of staff who have worked at UVHS for some time, but we also welcome new staff. some to lead new initiatives. I have been increasingly concerned about the pressures put on our children today and the anxiety this creates. In order to support children who are struggling in this way, we have restructured our Learning Mentor Team to provide dedicated support in the area of mental health and anxiety. A great many of these issues permeate from social media and I would appreciate the support of parents in monitoring the way their children use this.

Geography News 🌑



he penultimate week of the summer term meant the return of our A Level geography fieldtrips. All A Level pupils attend 4 days of fieldwork which are tailored around their non-examined assessment projects. Pupils are required to come up with a focus for their investigation and then to design their own methodology which they then carry out in the field.

his year we have a wide range of geographical enquiries being undertaken, from the success of regeneration projects in Morecambe to drumlin investigations in the Lake District, to water quality in Keswick & Salford Quays.

'he first of the 4 days involved a day trip to Keswick. Pupils split into small groups to collect an assortment of data in a variety of locations in the town. Day 2 took us to Coniston where pupils walked up to the Coppermines Valley to investigate the impacts of human activity on the glacial landscape. Our 3rd day trip was to Salford Quays where our A Level geographers were able to explore the site to determine whether the area has been successfully regenerated, and the impacts of new developments in this diverse corner of Greater Manchester. Our final day of fieldwork took place in Morecambe where UVHS pupils were able to meet with Julian Inman, Senior Planner (Regeneration) at Lancaster City Council. This linked brilliantly with the Regenerating Places topic completed in Year 12 and we were then given a walking tour of Morecambe to see first hand where regeneration has already occurred, but also the priority areas for future regeneration.


ur now Year 13 cohort will work with the data they collected on their four days of fieldwork in order to begin to draw conclusions and evaluate the success of their investigations.



Sam: Crisp baked peppers with a panko breadorumb in a beetroot wrap. Zingy lime infused guacamole with salad and nachos!



Medical Needs in School

Students with asthma are encouraged to carry their reliever inhaler at all times. Parents are asked to ensure that their child has regular asthma checks at their GP or with their respiratory nurse and that their child brings their prescribed inhaler to school every day.

All inhalers must be clearly labelled with the child's name, dose and expiry date. Parents should inform school of any changes in medication and complete the annual Individual Health Care Plan available from the school office.

Children with potentially serious allergies will often be given an adrenaline auto-injector to carry at all times. This can help stop an anaphylactic reaction becoming life threatening.

his should be used as soon as a serious reaction is suspected, either by the person experiencing anaphylaxis or someone helping them.

If you've been given an auto-injector, make sure that you have informed UVHS of the medical condition and that a spare pen is kept at reception as well as the pen your child carries in their bag at all times.

STEM Faraday Challenge

On 13th June, 36 year 8 students took part in a "Remote Operations" Faraday Challenge supported by Lancaster Uni. In teams of 6, they had to build a prototype of a robotic arm that could be used to perform a surgical operation.

The students worked under a very tight time scale and had a limited budget to buy the required materials. They used their engineering skills to share their ideas and develop their designs into functioning devices. An Engineer from Siemens supported the students and assessed their progress throughout the day.

The prototypes were tested and showcased at the end of the day. Each team had to mimic an organ transplant operation using their device, and to make the challenge even trickier, they had to control their device by looking at a projected image of the operating table.

In addition to testing their devices, each team had to give a short presentation about how they had designed and built their prototypes and what they had learnt throughout the day. The enthusiasm and progress made by the students was incredible. Well done to everybody involved!



This July saw the annual **Year 12 Biology field trip** to Sandscale Haws. Students did their ecological sampling of the succession on the sand dunes for their required practical. Students were investigating the effect of the environmental conditions on the different species of plants present. Students spotted the Dune Helleborine and the Common Spotted Orchid, which are very rare and important species. Students said they've 'never learned so many plant species' and will always be able to spot the plant Hawk bit from Mr Ford's demonstration!

Engineering Masterclasses

Two of our students dedicated their time to attend 6 Engineering masterclasses on Saturdays at Lancaster University. They worked in groups on various challenges, each designed to explore how engineering is contributing to global progress in achieving the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

Each masterclass was led by a different engineering professional and involved some teaching and discussion before the students took part in hands-on activities including successfully flying micro drones, designing electric vehicles and investigating self-driving cars.





Y10 Biology Challenge

rs Hodgson Challenged the Year 10 separate Scientists to take part in the national Biology challenge alongside 50,000 other pupils. The content was challenging and involved aspects of biology that they have never studied. All students were at least highly commended, however 9 students achieved in the top 15% of the country to be awarded with the bronze award. DT Engineering Club

n Engineering club this term we have been very lucky as Siemens has sponsored the club and bought over £1000 of new Lego Robots and equipment. We all really appreciate this support and it will hopefully help us improve our programing and problem solving skills. The club has run after school all year and during this time we have continued to modify the models with extra pieces of Lego, such as light, sounds and touch sensors. We have plugged the robots into the computer and made program blocks on the NXT program.

↑ 1 were set the task of making the robot move accurately a certain distance forward and backward when we clapped. We then moved onto more advanced programming. We had to make the robots move around a rectangle of paper without touching it. This was a harder challenge, especially for the people with light sensors fitted, as the robots had to have further adjustments made to the programming. This was fun, even if you failed, and it was really good learning how to design the program. We entered the Lego League competition where we had to work as a team and with Tom, a STEM Ambassador from Siemens there to guide us, we were able to solve problems and produce a presentation. We really enjoyed this experience and gained lots from it.

Primary Science Fair



The year five students improved their investigation skills when conducting various experiments in the laboratory. They identified variables, made predictions, used scientific equipment to collect data and formed conclusions. Each group worked really hard and enjoyed themselves.

he students then went away and produced a display about their investigation and were encouraged to extend their projects back in their schools. On the 3rd of July they were invited back to UVHS for a Primary Science Fair where a small group from each school presented their projects. The competition was judged by Mike Jeschke from Seimens. He had a difficult task deciding on a winner but after visiting each display and questioning the children about their work he decided that the winner of the UDECC Year 5 Science Wizards trophy for 2019 was Lindal and Marton Primary School for their project on the effect of solvents and temperature on the sugar coating of skittles. Mike commended them on their scientific method and enjoyed the demonstrations they brought along. Well done to everyone who took part. We look forward to running the competition again next year.

<u>Salters' Festival of Chemistry</u>

n April Mr Gannon and Mrs Lees from n April Mr Gannon and Ivil S Lector the Chemistry Department took some Year 7 and 8 students to Lancaster University for the Salters' Festival of Chemistry. They were given a series of Practical challenges and had to compete against many other schools to solve a chemical problem. The students did very well and learned lots about Chemistry and how a University chemistry department works. The day finished with a colourful demonstration lecture with plenty of fizzing, banging, popping...well that's Chemistry!



Royal Society of Chemistry Schools'

VHS sent a Year 12 team down to UCLAN to participate in the Royal Society of Chemistry Schools' Analyst Competition. Run by the RSC's Analytical Division, this competition offers students studying A-level Chemistry in the first year of sixth form, the chance to put their experimental and analysis skills to the test. The competition was an opportunity for students to use analytical equipment not usually available in schools, gain additional practical experience and apply their knowledge of chemistry to problem solve.

The UVHS team of Jasmine, Chris and Louis were up against 27 other sixth form teams. In a very high quality and competitive field the students did themselves proud coming 3rd overall and deservedly winning individual prizes.





Internships

Well done to our 8 Year 12 students who have been successful at gaining internships at Siemens, Oxley and Bender this summer. This is a fantastic work experience opportunity for them to develop their skills in a local industry. The students will spend 4 weeks designing

solutions to real life engineering problems within their business areas. They will each produce a technical report and deliver a presentation which will ultimately lead to a Gold CREST Award.

n Monday 1st July 9 Y12 pupils from UVHS travelled down to Oxford to participate in the Open Day Plus event in order to get a taste of university life and access talks and workshops about the university, the application process and subjects they were interested in.

The group were hosted by the historic Queen's College, whose alumni include Rowan Atkinson, Tim Berners-Lee and King Henry V. After arriving in the afternoon and settling into their rooms, the pupils ate in the college dining hall and socialized in the

evening. The group put on a strong performance against other schools from the North West to win the Oxford themed quiz!

The next day, the pupils took part in a selction of talks and workshops learning about the university, how to put together a strong personal statement and getting a chance to speak to current students at Queen's.

Afterwards everyone split into groups for a range of academic tasters across different departments.

n the afternoon the pupils used some of their free time to broaden their experience of the city by seeing the sights, doing a bit of shopping and trying their hand at punting.

The final day consisted of the official university open day. UVHS pupils visited lots of different colleges and departments across the city before meeting back up for the long drive home.



A Body in the Lab

In the lab was lying still on the lab floor, bottles of chemicals around him. He had been working in the lab with various substances. Was it these chemicals, his nearby medication or something else that had killed him?

This is the scene that 25 Y12 Chemistry
Students saw when they travelled to Lancaster
University for a Chemistry Master class with Mr
Gannon and Mrs Frost. They had to determine
which of the substances had caused the 'fictitious
death'. They established this by using infrared, ultra
violet and mass spectrometry along with thin layer
chromatography and nuclear magnetic resonance
spectroscopy, which the university provided.

UVHS covers the theory of these analytical techniques, but students had a hands on experience to help solve this hypothetical crime. Student were challenged to complete practical techniques and make conclusions using secondary data to identify compounds in the bottles and identify the culprit. Chemistry came through and we solved the crime.

n July 1st Miss Thompson and Mrs Anderson took a group of English Language students and some prospective students of English Language in our leaving Yr11 to Lancaster University for a day of fascinating lectures on the relatively new area of study that is Forensic Linguistics. We were given a brief history of the specialism SUPPORTING SOURCES? by Dr Willem Hollman that took us through some of the earliest applications on cases like the wrongfully accused Timothy Evans, whose story was made famous in film Rillington Place. This put the day into context well for what was to come

Next up was an interestingly titled section called, "Pressure-cooked pets and a ban on bagpipes: how to spot misleading and fake news." William Dance talked to us about his research in this area. Giving us insight into how we can fact check and ensure we are not taking in by "news" with questionable bias or less than honourable intentions.

hen came perhaps the most fascinating section of the day, and the most poignant; "Catching a killer with forensic linguistics." Dr Claire Hardaker is a forensic linguist who helps the police in their investigations. After some guidance on the types of language patterns we could consider and how she goes about her work, we were given a selection of real texts that were involved in a murder case that Dr Hardaker had consulted on. There were known texts from the victim, known texts from the accused and a series of texts that were in question. Through analysing these texts the group was able to ascertain that the questionable texts were more likely to have been written by the accused to cover his tracks than by the victim, even though they came from her phone. These findings were part of the evidence that sent him to prison.

Finally the day finished with a session on lie detection - not the Jeremy Kyle kind, but the linguistic kind. Matthew Gillings took us through some of his work looking into the linguistic "tells" we have when we lie and how these can be applied by organisations like border control and immigration.

verall, it was a fascinating day. I think everyone left having learnt something new that we can apply in our lives outside the classroom.



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ur UVHS team of Dylan, Rebecca, Dan & Lily won the South Cumbria event and joined other aspiring mathematicians from across the UK to compete on Monday 17 June in the National Final of the UKMT Team Maths Challenge 2019.




A Level Results
