A man with a penchant for Tuc cheese sandwiches, school canteen flapjack and the very occasional pint in his local, he has been relentless in his work with his "pack of unruly hounds". A standard interview question for a job at UVHS is about the last lesson on a Friday, a



time when he has often been found "taking the temperature of the school" by popping in to lessons. Staff and students alike have always known that he has a genuine interest in everything that is going on in the school... and this has often manifested itself in his joining in (and sometimes even taking over!) the lessons he visited.

I know I have not always been successful but I go knowing that I have always tried my hardest for our school and its students. As I have said to many parents, I would never guarantee success but would promise 120% effort!



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#### CAMBRIDGE PHILOSOPHY TRIP In Febru-

**ary the** Religious Studies A Level groups attended a series of 3 lectures given by leading academic heavyweights at the beautiful venue of the Cambridge Union Debating Chamber. Previous speakers in this chamber have included Winston Churchill, Stephen Hawking, Richard Dawkins, HH Dalai Lama and, Clint Eastwood, to name but a few.

The three philosophers we were privileged to witness were Dr James Paget who spoke about Mark's Gospel from the New Testament; who Mark was, how reliable it is as an account of the story of Jesus, how it was written and whether it relied on other sources.

The second speaker was the internationally renowned A C Grayling who was (in his words) "the resident atheist" and who talked about his experience as an atheist and his reasons for being one. Rather than calling it atheism, he preferred humanism as atheism means 'no belief in god' and so it still references God even though it has nothing to do with what Grayling thinks and how he acts.

The final speaker was Professor Richard Swinburne, which was actually really exciting because we study his work as part of the A level syllabus, and he received something of a rock-star welcome by the packed audience. His topic was the existence of God and Swinburne put forward an empirical argument in regards to this to try and prove their existence by building on Leibniz's law and Occam's Razor (basically that the simplest solution is usually the answer). We were also able to speak to all of them after the lectures were over and continue the debate on a personal level.

A special mention needs to go to Mr Wallace, who piloted

the venerable school minibus to Cambridge and back with every sign of enjoyment, despite the fact that the minibus struggles to reach 60 mph! It was a fantastic experience and we all got a huge amount from it.

Reading Buddies is still going strong at UVHS. Every week over 50 sixth form students pair up with Y7 students in order to read to, be read to and to foster a love of reading. The atmosphere is truly fantastic; the sound of so many people reading, almost in harmony, has been likened to the choral chanting of Tibetan monks.



The feedback is wonderful too. Students experience many benefits from the scheme, not just to do with their reading. It builds confidence, it builds relationships and it allows students to feel that struggling to read, or feeling reluctant about it, is not uncommon—but it can be overcome. It just takes a little time, a little support, and the right book.

#### Coversations with the Bishop


On Friday 9th March the BPE department hosted a lecture by The Right Rev Dr John Thompson,

eval torture methods (some of which were quite eye watering).

On Monday morning, we visited Whitehall Palace Banqueting Hall, where Charles I was beheaded in 1649. We climbed up the same steps that he ascended to meet his own demise and admired the impressive Rubens celling. The afternoon was spent at the magnificent Churchill War Rooms and the huge exhibition on Churchill's life, which explained everything from his early life, to his involvement in the Cold War.

Day 3 and we walked to the Imperial War Museum, an imposing building containing everything from Spitfires and Harrier Jump Jets, to medals and propaganda posters. The most harrowing part of the museum was the Holocaust exhibition. This contained a vast array of documents, video footage and artwork. Put together, they showed to us the horrific acts of the Holocaust carried out by the Nazis. In the evening ... let's set the scene: everyone quietens down as the first note of the musical echoes throughout the Lyceum Theatre.... 'Nants ingonyama bagithi Baba!' The group certainly enjoyed the two time Olivier Award-winning musical, the Lion King.

The final day and we visited the Houses of Parliament where Charles I was put on trial and found guilty. In the House of Commons, we were told the history behind the tradition of slamming the Commons door on the Monarch's representative stemming from Charles' reign when he attempted to arrest five MPs. To end our tour, we visited the House of Lords, then passed through St Stephen's Hall. After our tour, we were lucky enough to speak with John Woodcock and hear his opinions on political matters, as well as him telling us about his life as a Member of Parliament.

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## PCR in a Box On Thursday 1st March

we were delighted to welcome two researchers from the University of Lancaster into the department. They delivered a PCR research in a box session to all our Y13 Biology students. In this session students were given the opportunity to experience working with equipment used in a university laboratory. They started with a masterclass in pipetting and this was then developed into how to use this skill to conduct a PCR and gel electrophoresis.

These are processes that are covered in the A-level specification but we do not have the equipment to cover practically in school. This visit gave the stu-



dents an opportunity to have hands-one experience working with these techniques. This was invaluable as it consolidated their understanding as well as inspiring them for the next step in their learning journey at they begin to prepare for University.



#### **FRENCH FOR BUSINESS EXPERIENCE DAY**

n January 11 of our Y9 students were ■invited, along with students from St. Bernard's, Dowdales and Walney to attend a French Experience Day arranged by Furness Enterprise Consortium, funded by STEM and hosted by St Bernard's School. French-speaking

employees from Glaxo and BAE were also invited to support the students during the day, offer-

> ing students an insight into how languages are important in their own roles and to give invaluable linguistic support with the tasks during the day.

The 'Apprentice' style day was linguistically challenging but extremely rewarding. A brief was given to the students at the start of the day to design a new prototype of a well-known toy, conduct market research on their chosen design and then to 'market' their product by producing a short video and a written brochure. They finally presented their product to a panel of judges (the MFL teaching staff and the guests from industry), all of course in French!

The students were given the opportunity not only to practise their French in real-life business situations, e.g. compiling emails, ordering raw materials, making telephone calls. They also had the chance of working alongside new 'colleagues' from other schools and to learn and use, at times, very technical language.

The final presentations by all of the students were of an exceptionally high standard and our UVHS students were a credit to themselves and our school. Some were praised individually for their outstanding performances and as a result, were awarded additional certificates and prizes for their personal contribution to the tasks and activities. It was an absolute pleasure to work with our students and see them interact and perform in such a mature and professional way.



#### **WORK EXPERIENCE**

**Our annual Y10** programme took place 5th-9th March. Students spent the week with an employer, with placements ranging from Barrow, Newcastle and Manchester. Y10 student Ruth said, 'Work experience is an invaluable opportunity for students to experience what it's like in the workplace.
