

Coping with stress





No coursework/controlled assessment.

An additional speaking/presenting grade (awarded as P, M or D) which students should have completed towards the end of Year 10.



English Language Paper 1 – 50% of GCSE

1 hour 45 minutes Section A Reading 20th or 21st Century fiction – one extract. (40)

One piece of descriptive or narrative writing. (40)

Q1. Read lines 1-7. List four things about... (4)

Q3. Refer to whole source. How is it structured to interest the reader? (8)




Grade 7 Question (Grade A Higher Paper only)
