The cinema was originally opened for the James Brennan company in 1937 and seated over one thousand people: a huge accomplishment for a pre–WWII Cinema. The cinema has since changed ownership multiple times, even becoming a bingo hall at one point. The cinema was last sold to Mrs A Armer, who is involved with other businesses in the local area, making the cinema a true local gem.

The Roxy has a unique art deco style décor and is described as having 'old style charm', with its interval ice cream and classic ticket machines. A truly wonderful business which deserves the support of its local community.



#### The Big Garden Birdwatch 2022

This year marks the 43<sup>rd</sup> year of the RSPB hosting the Big Garden Birdwatch. Over a million people took part in 2021 and this year, it took place in the winter term on the 28<sup>th</sup>-30<sup>th</sup> January. This event helps the RSPB to track whether species are increasing or declining. All you need to do is write down all the birds that you see in an hour. You can only count the birds that land. Go online and submit your results.



Even if you don't see anything, it is still important to let the RSPB know. If the RSPB sees a bird becoming endangered, then they know where to find them so that they can help. That is why the Big Garden Birdwatch is such an important event to take part in.

Over the years, many birds have increased their population such as the goldfinch, which increased by 50% over the past decade. Sadly, however, some bird's population have declined, such as the house sparrow, greenfinch, and the thrush. Over the past 40 years, the Big Garden Birdwatch has realised that during the winter, more birds are attracted to your garden, seeing it as a place for shelter, warmth, and food: it's not all bad news!

Although the Big Garden Birdwatch is over this year, there are still many ways to get involved in local wildlife. You could visit Leighton Moss or Foulshaw moss (owned by the RSPB) to see a broad range of animals such as lizards, snakes, buzzards, murmuration's of starlings, and many more. Let us know if you do! In January 2022, South Lakes Safari Zoo in Dalton celebrated the birthday of their oldest rhino, Huubke. Huubke 26 which turned approximately half their expected age range. Safari Zoo affectionately refers to the rhino Huubie and is one of three male rhinos at the ZOO.

Wild rhinos are at great risk of becoming threatened. with low birth decline and the increase in poaching. In December 2021, rhinos were killed in a 24 hour period. The work of zoos and other wildlife agencies help protect the population of these beautiful creatures.
