 Λ /hat is Pi (π)? Pi is approximately 3.14 and this is the number of times the diameter of a circle fits around **V** the circumference (the outside of a circle). This is true for all circles. The number Pi goes on forever without repeating in any particular pattern. The first 10 decimal places of Pi are 3.1415926535. We use the Greek symbol Pi (π) to represent this number. In some countries, the 14th March is written as 3.14 hence Pi day.

To celebrate Pi day, we held a range of activities and competitions throughout the day.



Dupils were invited to memorise Pi to as many decimal places as possible. Theodora from Y9 performed particularly well, memorising Pi to 50 decimal places and Mrs Bower managed a staggering 110 decimal places; wow!



They asked our staff and pupils, with their parents' support, to contribute as much as they felt able to. Our finance department and helpers from the sixth form spent an afternoon counting the donations and the grand total raised was an outstanding **£3000** to donate to the Disasters Emergency Committee's Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal. I had been thinking of travelling around Latin America for years, and the idea of doing my first year of university online solidified my choice to take a year out. I worked locally to save up and booked a one-way flight to Mexico City. Leaving the Cumbrian winter behind I arrived in Mexico City mid-January and spent a week exploring the massive city. The city is actually built on a lakebed, and the identifying features of this are the old colonial buildings which sink into the ground multiple inches per year, and the few canals left in the south of the city, which were great to see accompanied by floating mariachi bands. Having studied Frida Kahlo's art at during my Spanish A-Level, going to her housemuseum was a must, and a sun-rise hot air balloon ride over the Aztec city of Teotihuacan was definitely a

highlight.

I then travelled into the State of Oaxaca, which is world famous for its food and drink. Oaxaca City itself is a colourful and lively city, and the huge food markets and mountain top Zapotec ruins were a great way to spend my time. Moving through the Oaxacan mountains I went to Puerto Escondido, a boiling surfer town on the pacific coast. The amazing pacific beaches up this coast were a great place to learn to surf, and the rural lagoon town of Chacahua gave us a real deserted-beach Mexican experience, as well as a swim with bioluminescent plankton under the clear view of the Milky Way. After a stop at the small town of San José del Pacifico above the clouds in the mountains, I moved over into the state of Chiapas - Mexico's most Indigenous state.







Carnegie

C ome of you might be familiar with the Carnegie book awards, now in their 86th year! Set up by Andrew Carnegie Jin 1936, the Carnegie Medal 'is awarded annually to a book for children and young people that creates an outstanding reading experience through writing' - and students from UVHS have been reading the short-listed titles this year. Amelia, James, Emma, Megan, Skyla and Pippa have been reading the books, sharing reviews and

talking about their favourites, before they put their final votes forward before the summer. Here's some of what they had to say:

'Guard your Heart'

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The book 'Guard your Heart' in my opinion is not the greatest, as it was very tense. Even though by the title and blurb it seemed to be more romantic, I could not get into it. I read around 150 pages and it did not really pull me in, like other books do.
