The Girl Who Speaks Bear' is an exhilarating adventure of bear sized beauty - quite literally, too. We follow a youthful girl called Yanka who sets about uncovering the truth about her past, her family, but most importantly, where she belongs. Yanka is relatable because we've all been her - questioning and challenging our beliefs about who we really are (and to be honest, some of us still are).

The descriptions of a snowy magical forest, complete with fairytale (subplots), were enthralling. Yanka is a fantastic character who manages to express the feeling of being an outcast while maintaining a warm personality.

Mousetrap, who is easily my favourite character, joins her on her journey first, bringing humour and wit to the story with his exaggerated stories of daring and a sense of self-belief that Yanka herself lacks.

As the story progresses, we see more of Yanka's 'herd' come together, a crew of diverse animals, and as the story suggests, they are stronger together, working as a team. It's a brilliant message.

It's a book full of wisdom and bears - the type of book you would enjoy reading over again to become more fluent in bear.
